

Lecture on Burrup art

A LECTURE, detailing the conservation work carried out on the rock art of the Burrup Peninsula, will be held at the WA Museum in Albany.

It's believed that more than 10,000 engravings are spread across 500 sites around the peninsula, making it home to the largest collection of rock art, or petroglyphs, in the world.

The museum's collection management and conservation executive director Dr Ian MacLeod will discuss how environmental factors such as climate and moisture have affected the bio-deterioration of this art form.

The lecture will be held on Thursday, April 26 at 6.30pm at the WA Museum in Albany.
